**Text and materials:** There is no required text. Case problems will be handed out in class and are adapted from: Cornely, Kathleen. <u>Cases in Biochemistry</u>. **Objectives:** This is the first seminar course in the two-semester sequence. This course is designed to introduce students to the essence of biochemistry and incorporates group and individual problem based learning through biochemical case studies. Your progress will be evaluated during class discussions, oral presentations and individual meetings with me. At the end of this course, you should be able to think critically about real world biochemistry problems, collect and evaluate information for problem solving from a variety of sources and effectively communicate your knowledge to a group setting.
